Verb Tense Chart

Simple Tenses: Simple Tenses are used to talk about a point in time.



Simple Past

- -Used to talk about completed actions in the past.
- e.g. I ate breakfast this morning.

Simple Present

- -Used to talk about routines and habits
- -To talk about things that are always true
- e.g. I eat breakfast every day.


Simple Future with 'will'

- -Used to describe an action that *will* happen at a point in time in the future.
- e.g. I will eat breakfast later.

Simple Future with 'going to'

- Used to talk about plans
- -To make predictions about the future
- e.g. I am going to see Juliet later
 - I think it's going to snow later.

Continuous Tenses: Continuous tenses are used whenever we are talking about a *length of time*.



Past Continuous

- -Used to talk about an action happening before (and perhaps after) another point in time.
- e.g. I was <u>eating</u> breakfast when my brother arrived.

Present Continuous

- -Used to talk about an action happening now, or around now.
- e.g. Right now, I am eating breakfast.

Future Continuous

- -Used to talk about things happening around a point of time in the future
- To talk about planned future events
- To make predictions about things happening at the time of speaking.

e.g. - I will be <u>eating</u> breakfast from 9:00 to 9:30..

Perfect Tenses: Perfect tenses are used whenever we are talking about a *point in time before another point in time*.



Past Perfect

- -Used to sequence two past events.
- e.g. I **had** already <u>eaten</u> breakfast when my brother arrived.

Present Perfect

- -Used to talk about an indefinite point in the past.
- -To talk about something that started in the past and continues into the present (for, since)
- To talk about a recently completed action.
- e.g. I have already eaten breakfast.

Future Perfect

- -Used to say how long something will have been in progress by a point in the future
- -To say that something will be finished before a particular point in the future.
- To make predictions about things happening at the time of speaking.
- e.g. I will have already <u>eaten</u> breakfast by the time my brothers arrives.

Perfect Continuous Tenses: Perfect continuous tenses are used whenever we are talking about a *length of time up to a point in time*.



Past Perfect Continuous

- -Used to say how long something has been in progress before another point in the past.
- e.g. I had been <u>eating</u> breakfast for 30 minutes when my brother arrived.

Present Perfect Continuous

- Used to talk about something that started in the past and is continuing into the present.
- -To talk about recently completed actions.

e.g. - I have been <u>eating</u> my breakfast for 30 minutes.

Future Perfect Continuous

- -Used to say how long something will have been in progress up to a point in the future.
- e.g. I will have been <u>eating</u> my breakfast for 30 minutes by the time he arrives.
